Kelly Smit: Hello, I'm Kelly Smit for the Capital Network and I'm here in Canberra with Andrew Barr, the chief minister of the Australian Capital Territory. Mr Barr, welcome and thank you for your time.

Andrew Barr: The big challenge is to make new technologies useful for the community and for the environment. We are lucky to be here in Canberra, the greenest capital of the world, and also a capital with a big appetite for new technologies.
